Report from Andy Cummings, JN

As the calendar year winds down, I want to reflect upon the successes of America's Boating Club of Greenwich. I have previously written about our events of the spring and summer, and I will not repeat these. What I want to focus on is the overall state of our squadron. In a word, our squadron is strong. Indeed, this is a status for which your Co-Commanders, Howard and I, take no individual credit. This is a result of the talent and dedication of many and of course the participation of you, our members.

First, our membership is steady. We currently have approximately 200 members. Of course we lose members to natural attrition, but we add new members on a regular basis - about 24 each year. There are two reasons for our steady membership: a quality education program and attractive membership events (and of course the successful promotion of the two).

Secondly, our financial condition is sound. With ample reserves, we will finish the current fiscal year substantially on budget. This is due to many years of good fiscal management, which includes running programs and events within budget, and the contributions of our educational programs. Having a quality educational program, however, is not enough. Courses need to be priced appropriately, operated within budget, and of course promoted in a manner that achieves scale. As a team, we have done all this.

Our financial success has enabled us to subsidize several of our popular events, such as the summer clam bake, the holiday party and the Change of Watch. Also subsidized are our monthly speaker events which are free. It also enables us to invest in our community. This year gave a total budgeted amount of \$3,000 to Sound Waters, Ship 6, the Greenwich High School sailing team and the Greenwich police scholarship fund.

Finally, our members are engaged. Our events are well attended. We have attracted some top-notch speakers who have willingly and enthusiastically donated their time. We get good speakers, in part, because we have a good audience. So, please continue to attend our speaker events as much as possible. Also, if you have an idea for a speaker, please reach out to any member of the Executive Committee. Don't feel that if you make a suggestion you need to run the event. Every good event starts with a single idea and your ideas are a significant contribution.

And on a related note, America's Boating Club of Greenwich was again the recipient of a pair of prestigious awards. Our squadron collectively and Susan Ryan personally received awards for the third highest number vessel safety examination of all squadrons nationally. These safety examination represent a substantial benefit to our boating community and help to ensure our local boaters are in compliance with safety requirements.

Stamford Ledge Lighthouse

Many of us have passed the Stamford Ledge lighthouse over the years, and if you are like me, you wonder what I could do to help save the magnificent light before it falls into the Sound.

Over 140 years ago, due to a local petition demanding a lighthouse to signal the dangerous approach to Stamford Harbor, Congress appropriated funds, and the lighthouse was built and placed in service in 1882. The lighthouse remained in service for 71 years until the Coast Guard discontinued its use as an official aid to navigation in 1953. Over the next 27 years, ownership of the lighthouse was transferred multiple times between the US government, individuals, and corporations with the hope of creating a landmark. In 1982, the lighthouse became privately owned. More recently, several uncoordinated attempts to acquire the lighthouse became consolidated by forming a non-profit organization, The **Stamford Harbor Lighthouse Project**, culminating in the lighthouse's acquisition.

The project has four phases:

- · Acquisition Fulfill the financial terms agreed upon with the private seller.
- **Restoration** Restore the Lighthouse's foundation, structure, and systems to bring them back to their original state.
- **Environment** Rehabilitate submerged lands around the lighthouse, improve water quality, protect wildlife populations, and mitigate damage from climate change.
- \cdot **Future** Create an endowment fund to ensure ongoing and future maintenance, environmental research, and education programs.

It is exciting to know that within the next two years, the lighthouse will return as a shining beacon preserved for future generations. The long-term goal is for the restored Stamford Harbor Lighthouse to become an educational and environmental center. Additionally, the project will partner with SoundWaters to institute education and research programs that benefit the environment and our community.

At long last, we have a path to channel our desire to preserve and protect the lighthouse for future generations. As you contemplate year-end donations, I hope you will consider donating to safeguard our lighthouse's future. **Donate here**

PHENOMENAL Safety Light!



Our own Captain Len Lipton HIGHLY recommends Greatland Laser's emergency signaling device to all boaters. He has had the one since 2002 and the CEO has given the discount code SAR for any America's Boating Club members who want to buy one. Price is \$145 less our 20% discount.

Shown above is the Rescue Laser Flare Magnum signaling device. Despite its name, this is NOT a replacement for flares. It is the size of a 2-cell penlight, so it fits in your pocket or with supplies or on a lanyard around your neck. It also can be aimed (as you do with a signal mirror) to 'target' a ship or plane. If, for example, you fell overboard or were in a dinghy (and of course did not have flares handy) this could save your life. Include it in your ditch bag.
